

FNEI CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S MESSAGE 2016

Wacheyeh!

I started my role as the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) for Five Nations Energy Inc. (FNEI) on January 19, 2016. In prior years, I was on the FNEI Board of Directors, including the Finance and Human Resources committee, and also acted as the Interim CEO for a couple of months in the fall of 2010. It's a pleasure to be back with FNEI.

We also welcome Mr. Michael Kataquapit, who is an Attawapiskat First Nation member, to the FNEI team! Michael began work at FNEI on July 4, 2016, as a 1st year Apprentice Substation Electrician!

FNEI, as you may be aware, was officially established on September 30, 1997, to realize the dream of an unrestricted, reliable, safe source of energy, with minimal environmental impacts for the First Nations of Attawapiskat, Fort Albany, and Kashechewan. FNEI is regulated by the Ontario Energy Board (OEB) under the Transmission system code, and is, therefore, obligated and bound by the Regulations, and operates strictly as a Transmitter. As you know, the energy sector is divided into three areas within the Province of Ontario - Generation, Transmission and Distribution. The ownership structure of FNEI is composed of the three local power corporations, specifically Fort Albany Power Corporation, Kashechewan Power Corporation, and the Attawapiskat Power Corporation. The Moose Cree First Nation, and the Taykwa Tagamou First Nation, are also members of the Corporation.

FNEI is the only transmission company in Canada that is 100% First Nation owned and operated by First Nations. We are very proud of that fact. The fact that we were also able to pro-

vide fibre optics to the communities, and the transfer of the responsibility to Western James Bay Telecommunications Network, is also something we are proud of.

On July 21 - 22, 2016, we had a Networking meeting with the Local Distribution Corporations to discuss common matters, and to share information. This meeting proved to be very productive, and we plan to have them on an annual basis. We brought this information to FNEI's Strategic Planning meeting held on September 7 -- 8, 2016.

As a Transmitter, FNEI is required to file a Transmission Rates Application with the OEB. Basically, this is when we ask the OEB to approve our revenue requirements for the next five (5) years. It is a long complex process where we must file extensive evidence to support our request, to ensure we operate our transmission system in a safe and reliable manner. We submitted our Rates Application on Wednesday, July 27, 2016.

Finally, FNEI will have its' 20th Anniversary on September 30th, 2017. It is truly a good news story for all people in the Mushkegowuk Territory, especially those communities that have benefitted from FNEI's work. We are always open to share our story with other First Nations, including those communities in Northwestern Ontario that are just starting their journey to receive safe, reliable energy, with minimal environmental impacts.

2016 FNEI Operations Updates

Our team keeps working hard to improve reliability of the transmission system, reduce number and time of unplanned and planned outages and improve fiber optic communication link reliability.

Main projects of 2016

Kashechewan TS

FNEI staff, in coordination with Costello Utility Consultants, who have provided engineering services, and Powertel Utilities Contractors Limited, installed a bypass for the older part of the station and the breaker for the Kashechewan- Attawapiskat High Voltage line. On the secondary side, FNEI, with help of local crew, installed new cables and changed configuration, this modification will allow to perform maintenance on the equipment with minimum interruptions of the power supply.

Fort Albany TS

Installed additional disconnect switch and changed High Voltage bus configuration to be able to isolate sections of the transformer station and minimize outages related to maintenance.



Fiber Optic shelters in Moosonee, Fort Albany, Kashechewan and Attawapiskat, now equipped with backup generators, and FNEI delivered these backup generators during the winter 2016 and installed it this summer.

Oil preservation system: The Northern climate has challenging conditions when temperature difference from winter to summer around 80°C (-43 to +37), transformer oil expanding and shrinking during this temperature swing. The compensation for this purpose provided by manufacture is not sufficient and after the hot weather when pressure released from the transformer tanks, cold is creating negative suction which we usually tried to compensate in the late fall by going around all the stations with the tank of "dry air" and adjust the pressure. Sometimes, it is impossible to catch the tipping points and day when we have to do the procedure. Now, the new system will automatically compensate for the weather effects. The FNEI crew is currently working on installation of the units.

Right of Way brush cutting: in 2016, all planned work was completed for cleaning islands between Fort Albany and Kashechewan and continues work North from Kashechewan, upcoming winter plans are to start working from Attawapiskat towards Kashechewan. For the new season, FNEI purchased additional brush cutting unit to improve the performance and reduce downtime.

On behalf of the FNEI Board, we wish Nathan great success with his continuing studies!!

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
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FNEI CONGRATULATES SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS 2015-2016








CONSERVATION ON THE COAST PROGRAM

Conservation on the Coast – a Year in Review:

The past year has been another exciting one for the Conservation on the Coast (CotC) program! The Power Corporations' conservation programs are being implemented in all three communities and the Community Energy Plan process has been ongoing with an action plan due in the fall of 2016.

Attawapiskat, Kashechewan, and Fort Albany, Power Corporations, as a condition of their provincial operating license, are required to offer conservation programs to their customers. This is no different than any other power corporation in Ontario. The Power Corporations are working together, along with FNEI, to deliver these programs.

The most visible program is the energy retrofit of approximately ten homes per year in each community. The energy retrofits include the installation of exterior insulation to the walls and foundation, air sealing, adding more insulation in the attic space, and installing plastic on the earthen floor of the crawlspace to stop moisture migration into the house.

This work started in 2014 with energy audits done on 100 homes in each community. The results of those audits created an initial list of homes, that, from an energy savings perspective, needed the most amount of work. The energy retrofit work is being done in full consultation with the respective Housing Manager.

Ten homes were retrofitted in 2015, and twenty more in 2016 and 2017. If our work is done well and the Power Corporations can demonstrate a significant reduction in electricity consumption in the retrofitted homes, then our funder, the Independent Electricity System Operator (IESO) will provide further resources to retrofit an additional twenty homes in each community. If everything works out a total of fifty

homes per community will be more comfortable and affordable to heat.

More homes will receive an energy audit over the course of the conservation program and, at a minimum, they will have some basic energy efficiency products (LED bulbs, hot water pipe wrap, water heater insulation blanket etc.) installed.

There is a local work crew, foreman and a Conservation Coordinator in each community doing the energy retrofits. Assisting the local staff and managing the conservation programs on behalf of the three Power Corporations is Mr. Craig Nootchtai, and providing ongoing technical assistance are Mr. Rick Brant and Ms. Gail Lawlor.

In August 2016, four IESO staff, including Mr. Terry Young, VP of Conservation and Ms. Kaili Sermat-Harding, Assistant Deputy Minister, Conservation and Renewable Energy Division, with the Ontario Ministry of Energy, visited all three communities and our local staff proudly toured them to a variety of homes that demonstrated the quality workmanship of our energy retrofit crews.

Our Provincial government guests were impressed with our work and they now have a better understanding of the problems facing the First Nations including the difficulty and expense of shipping building materials. Local caterers provided wonderful meals in each community.

We know there is a lot of work to do in the homes in all three communities. Many foundations need to be repaired or replaced, roofs need to be re-shingled and windows and doors need to be replaced before we can add insulation and draft proofing. Unfortunately, major repairs are outside the CotC mandate but we are working collaboratively with each Housing Manager and leadership to find other options and funding.

The Community Energy Plan (CEP) process has been ongoing over the past two years with several meetings with Chiefs and Councils, youth and community members. In general, a CEP looks at opportunities for communities to reduce the amount of energy used, ways to use energy more effi-

ciently and to explore the viability of producing energy from renewable sources. Emerging key themes include the need to build local capacity of skilled trades, explore options to resolve shifting foundations, improve housing through the implementation of housing policy and renewable energy. An action plan will be presented in the fall that reflects the key themes and celebrates the actions taken to date to move toward a more sustainable future.

The CotC and the CEP goals are the same – "Working together to make our homes safe, healthy, comfortable, durable and energy efficient." Good progress continues to be made and we look forward to even more positive actions in the coming years.


